Make a Plan

Remember, during a disaster what's good for you is good for your pet, so get them ready today. If you leave your pets behind, they may be lost, injured – or worse. Never leave a pet chained outdoors. Plan options include:

- Plan a route – It's important to know your evacuation route
- Create a buddy system in case you're not home. Ask a trusted neighbor to check on your animals.
- Identify shelters. For public health reasons, many emergency shelters cannot accept pets.
- Find pet friendly hotels along your evacuation route and keep a list in your pet's emergency kit.
- Locate boarding
- Locate a veterinarian or animal hospital in the area where you may be seeking temporary shelter, in case your pet needs medical care. Add the contact information to your emergency kit.
- Have your pet micro chipped and make sure that you not only keep your address and phone number up-to-date, but that you also include emergency contact information
- Save my Pet window decal can help first responders know you have pets inside

Items for your go bag – for 72 hours

- Backpack or Pet Carrier
 - Mayday Pet Food – 5-year shelf life, 72-hour emergency ration (dog or cat)
 - Datrex Water 12 bags per dog – 4.227 fl. Oz. Sachets 5-year shelf life (Plastic Bottles only have a 1 year shelf life).
 - 2 - Collapsible Bowls
 - Slip Lead 6' – Great for emergency if you need to get out quick.
 - Waste Disposal Bags (roll)
 - Mylar Blanket (This will help to keep 90% of your pets body heat in)
 - Clip on LED light
 - Waterproof Documentation Bag – great for keeping Pets shot records, ID card, Medicine and we recommend a current photo of you with your pet, in case you get separated you will have proof it's your pet.
 - Pet ID card include Micro Chip number – emergency contact information, Vet's phone number
 - Current Shot records
 - 1 week of your pets medicine
 - Pet First Aid Brochure (downloadable from our website)
 - Toy
 - First Aid Kit – Kit should include pet wound/burn cream, Vet wrap, hydrogen peroxide spray, tweezers, cotton swabs, antiseptic wipes, cold pack, non-adhesive pads
- Optional**
- Muzzle – If you pet is injured this will keep you safe
 - Crate, zip ties, duct tape
 - Permanent Marker (In case you need to put your phone number on your pets belly)
